


## Saturday Sampler-Block 23

## Puss in the Corner

Block finishes 6" square (6½ unfinished)

This is probably the most intricate block in the whole series. It isn't hard, but the pieces are small and the seams create bulk where they meet. Just measure and sew accurately and your block will turn out just fine!



What you need:


Fabric 1 (center): one 2½" square (A) Fabric 2 (green): one 3¼" square (B) and six 1¾" squares (C) and (D) Fabric 3 (blue): four 1½" squares (E) Fabric 4 (white): one 3¼" square (F), four 1⅛" squares (G) and (H) and eight 1½" squares (I)

Sew it together:

1. Draw a diagonal line on the back of four 1<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" Fabric 4 squares (fig. 1). Place two squares RST on opposite corners of the 3<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>" Fabric 2 square . Sew a scant <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>" seam on both sides of the drawn lines (fig. 2). Cut apart on the drawn lines (fig. 3). Press toward the small triangles (fig. 4).

2. Place another 1<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" Fabric 4 square RST on the corner of one of the units from Step 1. Sew a scant <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>" seam on both sides of the drawn lines (fig. 5). Cut apart on the drawn lines (fig. 6). Repeat with the remaining unit from Step 1 and another 1<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" Fabric 4 square to make four flying geese units. (fig. 7)


3. Repeat Steps 1 and 2 using the 3¼" Fabric 4 square and four 1<sup>™</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" Fabric 2 squares (fig. 8).




5. Draw a diagonal line on the back of the remaining two 1%" Fabric 4 squares (fig 10). Pair each with a 1%" Fabric 2 square and sew ¼" seam on both sides of the drawn line. (fig. 11). Cut apart and press seam toward the Fabric 2 triangle (fig. 12). Yield 4 HST units.





6. Using the HSTs from step 5, the four 11⁄2″ Fabric 2 squares, and the four 11⁄2″ Fabric 3 squares make the corner fourpatches as shown in fig. 13-15. Make four units.




4. Using the Fabric 1 square, the flying geese units, and the four-patch units, piece the block as shown below. Press seams open.








Here are some layout ideas for using Puss in the Corner blocks in a quilt.
